## Why does incarceration drive people away from the polls?

#### **Political Efficacy**

- Intense criminal justice contact: defendants were poorly treated
- Stigmatization
- Bad experiences eroded the trust in political institutions (mainly external efficacy)

#### **Resources Deprivation**

- Loss of earnings (about \$40,000 on average)
- Unlikely to be employed in the future
- Loss of group membership
- These are all indispensable for political participation

#### Misinformation

- Felony disenfranchisement laws vary by states
- Individuals often incorrectly believe that they were ineligible to vote

#### **System Avoidance**

- Criminal justice agencies keep formal records of defendants
- Individuals subjected to intense criminal justice contact are less likely to engage with institutions that keep formal records, in order to avoid scrutiny and further entanglement with law enforcement

#### Mechanical

• Incarceration could extend through the election for some defendants

• Do people always disengage from politics after being incarcerated (or being mistreated by the law enforcement?)
